Background

- Children with skin conditions frequently face bullying and reduced quality of life.
- Proper skincare and sun protection are essential to prevent skin cancer.
- Misinformation about skin and sun safety is widespread on social media.
- Educating primary school children may reduce stigma by fostering early understanding and empathy.

- Teacher guide, lesson sheets, classroom activities, skin passport, references to children's books and educational video's.
